Local Equestrians Compete In The East

In the recent October school holidays, 2 local Dardanup equestrians travelled to Victoria for the <u>Australian Interschools</u> <u>Equestrian Championship</u> 2023 held in Werribee Victoria. Jorja Wareham travelled with her pony Tiaja Park Fearless (bred by her mother Rochelle Wareham) from Dardanup stopping at Fraser's Range, Ceduna and Monarto in SA before arriving in Melbourne. Jorja competed in both the Show Hunter class placing 9th and in Dressage where she placed 7th place for the Novice and 8th place for the Elementary dressage championship.



Amelia Addison chose not to take her horse across the country – but was supplied a pool horse by Equestrian Australia to compete on – this meant the horse that she rode to compete on was practically a stranger to her. This was quite a challenging with only 3 practice rides before she was to compete. Amelia competed in two events: Working Hunter and Combined Training (80cm) – this event consists of a dressage test and an 80cm showjumping round and she placed 10th in the championship.



The Noongar season of **Birak** begins in December. It is known as the first summer and we can expect less rain and warmer weather. The wind patterns are predictably Easterly in the morning and Westerly in the afternoon. Summer

has come a month early this year and we have been dealing with hot temperatures since October. With the prospect of a very long, hot summer, what can we do to prepare our garden?

Water wisely. As the weather heats up, our gardens can begin to dry out. It is a good idea to check your irrigation regularly to make sure it is watering where you want it to. Clean your filters, repair holes and maybe grab a few spare bits to fix any issues as they arise. For best hydration, water before 8am or after 6pm. Never in the heat of the day. In the middle of the day you may see some plants looking particularly 'droopy', often this is their way of conserving water (especially pumpkins, melons & zucchinis) and they will go back to normal when it cools off. If you are planting out seeds and seedlings, it is best to do this late in the afternoon so that they have longer to settle in before the heat of the next day. Remember to water them in well with seaweed solution to reduce transplant shock.

Mulch, Mulch Mulch!! If you haven't already mulched, now is the time! Mulch helps to keep in soil moisture, reduce evaporation and reduce weeds. There are 'Organic' and Inorganic (gravel & stones) types of mulches. Organic ones were once 'alive', think Hay, Straw, Wood-chips and Bark. These will break down over time, adding organic matter to your soil. Choose one that has irregular shapes or is fairly course so that water can percolate through and it doesn't pack down. Leave a few cm around each plant for good air flow and to reduce any potential rot and fugal issues. Not all mulches are equal, Don't use if it is unpleasantly smelly - ammonia, sulphur or vinegar smells mean sour or acidic mulch (2-4pH). 'Sweet' smelling mulch has a more neutral pH (6-7). Although, if your mulch has chicken manure added it won't be quite as sweet smelling! Use the one you have easiest access to and is within your budget. I use WA made DSATCO mulches, they have a variety of products and don't come with any weed seeds. Purchase them locally at Dardanup Rural, Donnybrook Hardware or Bunnings. Living mulches are also an option.

hardy ground covers such as Warrigal greens and nasturtiums are also edible!

Create some Shade. Capsicums, Tomatoes and Cucumbers are particularly susceptible to sunburn. 30% shade cloth is best as it allows enough light for the plants to continue to grow and you can leave it up all year. I sourced mine from Jaylon Industries in Malaga. Alternatively, use what you have access to (even an old beach umbrella) just make sure your plants get some good sunlight exposure in the cooler parts of the day.

Mitigate some risks. Being prepared is sensible in our climate and location. Summer storms can be destructive to our gardens so keep on top of your tree pruning. Once your fruit has been harvested you can give them a haircut, this helps reduce their water requirements and keeps them at a workable height. Bushfire preparation plans are possibly more relevant if you are on acreage, near parkland or remnant bushland or live on the outskirts of a town/settlement. It doesn't hurt to have an understanding of what you need to be organised when the power goes out, the town water doesn't work and/or you need to relocate in a hurry. Check out <u>https://</u>mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au for relevant resources.

What can I plant in December and January? Honestly... Don't wait, you need to get them in early this year. You can still plant more of your summer crops into December as most crops will tolerate the heat, however you will find that some don't like it too hot. Shade is a must for all newly planted seedlings for at least a week. Note: Lettuce seeds tend not to germinate when temperatures are above 25 degrees C and Beans can drop their flowers when temperatures get above 27 degrees C.

Leaf crops: Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Cabbage and Chinese cabbage. <u>Root & onion crops</u>: Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Scorzonera, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/Oca and Jerusalem artichokes. <u>Legume crops</u>: Climbing Beans, Dwarf Beans and Asparagus pea. <u>Curcubit & Solanum family</u>: Choko, Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Rosella and Sunflowers. <u>Herbs</u>: Basil, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary, Summer savoury, Horseradish and Chives.

You can start planting seeds of your winter brassica crops in January, especially for slow growing Brussel sprouts and if you want early crops of Broccoli or cabbage. Keep them moist in the shade.

Wishing you a very Merry Festive Season and Happy New Year. Fingers crossed that you all stay safe from Bushfires and are able to enjoy your summer garden abundance. Until next year, Happy Gardening!

ECE Fire Brigade Visit



Dardanup Environmental Action Group Update

DEAG is happy to report that they have recently had some favourable outcomes in regard to Cleanaway's Operation of the Banksia Rd Landfill.

The EPA Assessment

Firstly, in April 2021 Cleanaway submitted a proposal to the EPA for the Construction and Operation of a further three Landfill Cells at Banksia Rd (Cells 9, 10 and 12A). The EPA then sought public comment as to whether they should assess this proposal. In response there were 16 submissions requesting a Public environmental review and one who straight out opposed the proposal.

As a result, in August 2021 the EPA advised there would be an assessment of the proposal with a 4 week public review period in April/May 2023 (yep, after 2 years of assessment & Cleanaway providing more information we, the public get 4 weeks in which to assess over 40 documents running to '000 pages and write a submission). Fortunately, the Shire of Dardanup, DBCA, DEAG and three members of the public found the time to do this.

From here on it gets bitter/sweet.

In August 2023 the EPA quietly released on their website a 437 page response to these submissions prepared for Cleanaway by the same consultant who had prepared much of the initial proposal application. I will say no more!

In September 2023 (ie. A month later) the EPA released their assessment report. To DEAG it appears that there was NO independent assessment done by the EPA. In their report they concluded that proposal may be implemented subject to the conditions recommended in Appendix A. For the most part the recommendations disappointing.

But there was one very satisfying outcome in that they set a maximum development height of 130 metres AHD (top of waste -128 metres plus 2 metres capping).

DEAG would like to think that all our lobbying and the effort DEAG took in taking photos and highlighting the discrepancies and misrepresentations in Cleanaway Visual Assessment report was instrumental in this.

The DWER Licence Review

If you thought two and a half years is a long time for the EPA to do an assessment, the DWER Licence Review started in December 2020, that is 3 years ago with requests for submissions and community consultation sessions in January 2021. Im sure some people will remember going along to the Dardy Hall to meet with DWER. A total of 23 submissions were made to this review by members of DEAG and the Dardanup Community.

Following the review, a revised and much improved version of the Licence was issued to Cleanaway in October 2021. This Licence had much more specific conditions, which DWER would be more able to enforce.

However, DEAG was still able to identify a number of gaps in the Licence and in October 2021 DEAG and members of the Community submitted appeals to the Appeals Convenor (AC).

Over the past two years as the Appeals Convenor investigated our concerns and consult with DWER and Cleanaway, DEAG continued to correspond and meet with the Appeals Convenor to clarify and provide additional evidence and material on the issues we had raised.

Finally in October 2023 we were advised that their recommendation had gone to the Minister and on 26 October we received a letter from the Hon Reece Whitby, Minister for Environment, that having considered the information available to him, including the Department's response to the appeal and the Appeal Convenor's report and recommendations, he had decided that the conditions of the Licence should be strengthened and he had have adopted in full the recommendations set out in the Appeals Convenor's report.

For DEAG this was a major achievement, as it was the first time in our 5 years of writing submissions and appeals that we had so clearly achieved a strengthening of the Licence Conditions. Whilst we did not achieve everything we were would have liked to; we did achieve:

- the strengthening of eleven conditions
- inserting of one new condition, and

the additions of new requirements in three tables.

These changes will mean that Cleanaway now have to;

Prepare a detailed and compressive Fire Management Plan and have it reviewed by a suitably qualified fire safety engineer. This plan is to include items such as

> credible emergency scenarios and clear procedures to manage them, including initial intervention measures, personnel responsibilities, notification and escalation procedures

identifies all required fire prevention and management infrastructure and equipment to be maintained on-site for the scenarios identified, including details on the distribution and operation of installed fire safety systems and water access requirements for fire-fighting purposes;

procedure for managing and disposing of recoverable fire wash waters from waste management areas;

training requirements and schedule for delivery of training to operational staff on emergency response procedures and the requirements of the Fire Management Plan

A condition is also to be included requiring the licence holder to also report any unauthorised fires, to the CEO, within 14 days of the fire and include: Details of the date, time and location of the fire; Measures used to control the fire; The cause, or suspected cause, of the fire; Any residual issues or impacts related to the fire, including discharge of fire-fighting wash water or other wastes from the premises and damage to landfill liners and any other landfill infrastructure; and proposed rectification of any damage or impacts.

- A condition is to be included requiring landfill staff to look for visual signs of feral cats and foxes within the landfill area and record presence/visitation within the feral animal register.
- A number of Conditions will be amended to require Titanium Dioxide Tailings (TDS) (solids and liquid) to be monitored for titanium, iron, chromium (III), potassium, chloride, sulphate, pH, electrical conductivity, calcium, magnesium, sodium, bicarbonate, uranium, thorium (elemental concentrations mg/L), radium-226 and radium-228 (radionuclide concentrations Bq/L).

Monitoring of uranium, thorium (elemental concentrations mg/L); radium-226 and radium-228 (radionuclide concentrations Bq/L) are to be included for groundwater monitoring bores.

A requirement to compare groundwater data collected with that used in the hydrological modelling.


Whilst the Appeals Convenor have confirmed that the TDS is radioactive, they have concluded that it may be classed as Very Low Level Waste (VPPW) which can be stored in a Landfill and that the design of TDS Ponds are appropriate for this.

Whilst this is reassuring, we do still have some reservations. However, the additional monitoring requirements for the TDS Tailings and groundwater will now provide the data required to clarify this.

If Cleanaway are the good corporate citizens who consult with and listen to the community as they claim, why has it taken almost four years, a countless number of submissions by DEAG and the community, numerous complaints to Pollution watch, and reviews by DWER and the Appeals Convenor, resulting in direction from the Minister to strengthen the Licence Conditions to get Cleanaway to do what any reasonable and responsible organizations would have done from the beginning?
