Potential for the outcomes of the group meeting to result in a financial gain, loss, benefit or detriment for a person with whom you have a financial relationship.

#### **Proximity interest**

You (or a person with whom you are closely associated) have a proximity interest in any matter that concerns:

- a proposed change to a planning scheme affecting land that adjoins the person's land;
- a proposed change to the zoning or use of land that adjoins the person's land; or
- a proposed development of land that adjoins the person's land (development refers to the development, maintenance or management of the land or of services or facilities on the land).

An interest that could, or could reasonably be perceived to, adversely affect the impartiality of the person having the interest and includes an interest arising from kinship, friendship or membership of an association.





## Update on major Building Maintenance and Projects

**Joy Welshman - Manager Operations** 

**Ferguson Hall** – A structural engineering inspection was undertaken to identify the remaining life of all stumps. Most stumps appeared in reasonable condition with some stumps out of alignment, leading to slight uneven floor in the main hall. Restumping quotes are being sourced. Drainage was found to be poor in the subfloor area and is causing movement and settlement of stumps.

**Ferguson BFB** – The Shire Senior Project officer has met with FCO of Fire Brigade to confirm maintenance to be undertaken in FY23/24. Quotes are in progress, after which maintenance will be completed in 2023.




