Logyard Supervisor, Sam Slotegraaf, said "these loaders have state-of-the-art technology, with 360 -degree cameras and radar detection (for collision avoidance) being just the start of their long list of features. However, it's their reliability that will be our best asset."

The main form as a muscle wasting disease affects perhaps 3 or 4 people per 100,000. It's deserving of recognition, more research and perhaps advocating for generally by us Lions as the charity group is voluntarily run. The club will donate \$2,500.

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Dardanup Veterinary Centre News

I've been very interested to come across a brief world of Australian history of Veterinary medicine.

"These days we don't chant incantations and make ritual sacrifices as in early times and we no longer blame demons, divine wrath and occult forces for pretty much every illness affecting domestic and wild animals."

Referencing an article from "A veterinary awakening" page 5 2011- A treatment for sick cattle from the late tenth century *Lacnunga* ('Remedies')

"Take the wart, put it upon gledes and fennel and hassuck and 'cotton' and incense. Burn all together on the side on which the wind is. Make it reek upon the cattle. Make five crosses of hassuck grass, get them on four sides of the cattle and one in the middle. Sing about the cattle the Benedicite and some litanies and the Pater Noster. Sprinkle holy water upon them, burn upon them incense and give the tenth penny in the church for God, after that leave them to amend; do this thrice."

A few facts:

Outbreaks of Rinderpest in Europe during the dark ages were attributed to earthquakes, floods and comets. Ancient Egyptian goddess Sekhmet was worshipped as "Lady of Pestilence" who could avert plagues and cure diseases OR send diseases against those who angered her. Her statues were coated with Anthrax to protect them from theft and vandalism.

As we know it Veterinary medicine started taking shape between mid-1600's to mid-1700's. In 1765 empress Mana Theresa of Hapsburg, Austria encouraged Veterinary teaching and Veterinary schools opened in western Europe and London after that. Developments in bacteriology, parasitology and immunology saw enhanced credibility of

the science medicine in the late 19th Century. In Australia it seems we were very lucky as horses and stock introduced in 1770-1850 caried few major diseases but as Australians need for livestock and the value of the sheep industry increased with the Gold Rush (1850) diseases came in. Tuberculosis, Bovine Pleuropneumonia, foot and mouth disease, Anthrax... Australian pioneer "vets" were farmers, stock inspectors ect with limited qualifications and then the earliest qualified veterinarians worked privately and for the government by about 1840's.

In 1858 a shorthorn cow imported to Melbourne was diagnosed with bovine pleuro-pneumonia. The recommendation for slaughter of her herd wasn't popular and advice by a government vet was ignored. Pleuro-pneumonia became the most devastating livestock disease in Australia, costing millions in lost livestock and restricted export.

When foot and mouth disease appeared in 1872 there was prompt action and involvement of Melbourne newspaper and decision to train vets in Australia.

Rinderpest virus came into Fremantle via shipping in 1924 and disease had to be controlled around the infected area (it was thankfully)

Australia now has a proud history of animal disease control and eradication (Tuberculosis, Brucellosis, Bovine Pleuropneumonia, foot and mouth disease, Anthrax, Rinderpest and several recent viruses Equine Influenza, BSE, Avian Influenza and the eradication of diseases, monitoring, inspecting, education, and biosecurity continues to the advantage of farmers and the general population. We now are very appreciative of Australia's Veterinarians (Domestic) and livestock/biosecurity/quarantine and disease management.

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The Noongar season of *Kambarang* continues. It is starting to heat up!! Make the most of the nice weather, get busy tidying up before it gets too hot and plant out the remainder

of your long season crops. Now is your last chance to plant Pumpkin seeds. Most varieties require 100 days to mature. They prefer enriched soil (being heavy feeders) which explains why they grow so well in old compost heaps.

I love the incredible diversity of a Summer vegetable patch and we are fortunate that in our Mediterranean climate we can grow food year round. Selecting varieties from places with a similar climate is a great way to help us have more success - *think* Spain, Italy, Greece, Turkey, Iran, India, Texas, California, Africa... the list is long and exciting! For me the best part about trying new herbs and vegies is that we get to try out new recipes!

One of the regular comments I hear from gardeners is that they are limited by space. Not everyone has a huge backyard, so what is the solution? Grow upwards of course! What vegies can you grow vertically? Climbing beans and Cherry tomatoes immediately spring to mind, but did you know that cucumbers and even pumpkins can be grown vertically? What you need to remember when choosing your variety is to select the climbing, indeterminate or sprawling types.

Beans, snow peas, mouse melons and perennial vines such as grapes or chokos have tendrils that anchor themselves to the support. Other plants such as cherry tomatoes, malabar spinach, tromboncino zucchini and cucumbers can need a bit of extra help. I use strips of old cotton t-shirts or sisal twine as garden ties, both can be composted at the end of the season. Larger fruiting varieties such as pumpkins, spaghetti squash and watermelons will need extra support as they form and ripen. Mesh or string bags can be used as slings.

Creating tee-pees with stakes or poles can be done directly in the ground or using several large pots. Why not utilise some larger prunings that you can't chip or compost as garden stakes. Another cost effective way of growing 'upwards' is to use Rio Mesh panels to create archways or garden walls. Using a structure like this not only gives you extra space but if you think about the orientation, you can also provide added shade for more tender vegies in the height of summer. I have several temporary fence panels (2m x 2.4m) in my vegie patch to act as living walls. The great part about these is they only weigh 6kg each and I can move them around with my rotation at the end of each season. I use a star picket and recycled bind-a twine to secure

each end - simple and inexpensive. In Summertime they are covered in a wall of beans, snow peas and/or tromboncino zucchinis.

Glorious Garlic! Harvesting time is nearly here and as your bulbs mature, keep an eye out for any scapes. A Garlic Scape is the flower stalk produced by hard-neck garlic bulb varieties and I find mine appear about 4 weeks before the bulbs are ready to harvest. Scapes are usually removed to encourage better bulb formation. They don't need to go to waste - they are very yummy added to stir-fries, sautéed with your asparagus and served over eggs for breakfast or added to a quiche. Your garlic bulbs are ready when 4 leaves from the bottom have died/browned off. I find a more reliable way to check is to brush a bit of dirt from around the top of the bulb, then run your finger around the outside. You should be able to feel 'bumps' just like if you run your finger over a clenched knuckle. These bumps are your well formed cloves. Cloves form in the last few weeks before harvest so if you happen to pick them too early they will resemble an onion inside when cut open. Hang them to dry in a shaded area before brushing off the dirt, trimming the roots and plaiting them for long term storage.

<u>Root & onion crops</u> - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip,
Scorzonera, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Yacon, Yam/
Oca, Jerusalem Artichoke

<u>Legume crops</u> - Dwarf Beans, Climbing Beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea

Curcubit & Solanum family - Cucumber, Luffa, Sweetcorn, Gourd, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Marrow, Zucchini, Tomato, Capsicum, Chilli, Tomatillo, Eggplant, Okra, Rosella, Sunflower. Herbs - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary and Summer sayoury

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
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














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Our Lady of Lourdes School Farewell Mrs Hegney





Travel Tales with Bev and Allen Mountford -Tour of the Kimberley From the Water

Following on from Jill and Tom Cross's and others, Kimberley Land Adventures:

We have also travelled and touched some of the Pilbara and Kimberley by road.

July 2016 Allen and Bev decided to tour the Kimberly cruising on a Catamaran to view the Kimberley from the water.

The Tour started with a flight from Perth to Broome with 2 nights in Broome before, being picked up on a beach in a Tender from the Catamaran, which had a drop down front, where we walked along with 19 other passengers, from the beach onto the Tender. Luggage was loaded by the crew onto another tender. No security checks, just onto the tender to be taken to the Catamaran.

Our accommodation was in a bunk cabin which was the only cabin available. It had a small wardrobe along with a small Ensuite. Both adequate and comfortable.

Before setting sail, we were welcomed on board by several crew and met other passengers.

The bonus for Bev, was the Artist in Residents, Robyn Collier from the Blue Mountains who Bev had participated in some of Robyn's workshops in West Australia and Eastern States. (Robyn has an online Website and worth having a look at especially her water paintings.)

Robyn painted many of the wonderful Kimberley sites while on the cruise.

The Itinerary started in Broome to:- Cape Leveque, Crocodile Creek, Talbot Bay and Horizontal Falls, Raft Point and Doubtful Bay, Sale river and Ruby Falls, Montgomery Reef, Fresheater Cove, Langgi Beach, Sheep Island, Prince Regent River, King Cascade Falls, Careening Bay, York Sound and the Hunter River, Mitchell Plateau, Bigg River, Mitchell River, Vansittart Bay, Jar Island - Bradshaws, Drysdale River, King George, Koolama Bay, Berkeley River, the last leg to Darwin.

Before the Berkeley River, the Captain realized a storm was brewing where the Indian Ocean and the Timor Sea met and was going to be rough.

We were given the opportunity to get off the Catamaran at the mouth of the Berkeley River to fly to Darwin which Bev and some other passengers decided to do. Allen thought he was going to cruise right to the very end, but at times thought he also should have got off. This ocean was a rare itinerary condition.

Vehicles from the Berkley Resort picked us up at the mouth of the Berkey River just after sunrise (early because the Catamaran had to cruise over the sandbank before the tide went out) to drive us to the Berkley Airstrip to meet the small plane for the flight to Darwin. The luggage followed on the Catamaran.

Flying over the landscape and looking below, Bev spotted a race track that was set out like the map of Australia. Very interesting. The above Itinerary was fabulous with so much to see and experience. Things not seen from the road. With so many photographic subjects. and experiences.

The crew were a credit to themselves and the cruise itself. The food was as good if not better than any upmarket Restaurant in any city. Barramundi and other fish, crayfish and crab was on the menu everyday with several other choices of food and sweets. Each afternoon after returning from touring there was a freshly cooked cake waiting for us.

The Glo on the scenery was magic after which we headed back to the Catamaran for a scrumptious dinner. One of the crew had a drone. He filmed all our outings and were ready for a movie show after dinner to see from the air where we had been.

On another land tour, we landed on the beach and walked to the plane wreck which crashed 400ks North of Broome during WW11. It certainly had a story to tell.

Fishing was another great adventure. Allen and Bev were lucky to be in the Tender mastered by the Catamaran Captain. The fish were being hauled in thick and fast, Bev even caught a big Barra. The captain got a call from the boat to say an unhappy passenger wanted to get off the boat because she was unhappy so far. Always one. So we had to rewind lines and head back so the Captain could call in the Flying boat to take she and husband off. Must say we didnt miss the complaining.

We walked and looked at Aboriginal Cave Paintings. On another land visit before visiting the Aboriginal Art Gallery where we experienced a smoking ceremony, after which the ladies gave us a lovely afternoon tea.

Cruised around some caves only sited from the water. Cruised Montgomery Reef and saw all the Turtles, excitingly cruised the Horizontal Falls and saw many different bird life, waterfalls and water features.

The waterfalls that fell into the pools below were amazing. Many with the sun shining through the droplets gave magnificent shows of rainbows.

One day we climbed a rockface with the help of the crew to the top, where there was a Lillypond pool which was suitable for swimming. No crocodiles like was in the pool below our climbing wall. A whale actually followed us in the Catamaran and put on a fascinating show for us, diving under the boat, rolling around, blowing his/her water spout. An experience some of us had never seen before.

Of an evening with the lights shining into the water, many eyes of crocodiles could be seen at the back boat ramp. The crew boys would clean the fish, crabs and crayfish on the ramp. Drone owner, Anton, slipped and fell into the water, talk about walking on the water, he wasn't in for long, especially with what was often seen lurking around. His arms and legs were going like propellers which no doubt lifted him out of the water nearly faster than the eye could see.

Of course the Dolphins also put on a show with snouts out of the water and dancing either welcoming us or trying to tell us something.

Sadly that cruised ended in Darwin for a couple of nights then flight back to Perth and into the real world.

There were so many more sites to see for another time. Allen at the age of 21 with a friend, toured the Pilbara and some of the Kimberly in Zephur Ute sleeping in a sleeping bag under the stars.

Allen slipped down a Gorge thinking he twisted his ankle to find out 60 years later he had actually broken it. Thus ankle reconstruction. Those days, when home it was back to work and milking. No XRay or fuss.
