Advocates For Future Funding, Community Growth In Canberra

From the Shire of Dardanup website

Shire of Dardanup President Tyrrell Gardiner, accompanied by Deputy Shire President Ellen Lilly and CEO André Schönfeldt, embarked on a productive week-long visit to Canberra last week. Cr Gardiner said their focus was to advance the interests of the Shire of Dardanup by engaging with Federal Ministers and Shadow Ministers, as well as key departments, to secure vital funding for upcoming projects.

He said central to their agenda was the promotion of the Shire's strategic projects outlined in the recently adopted Advocacy Plan and Strategic Community Projects documents, approved by Council in March this year.

"Highlighting these key initiatives served as a cornerstone in discussions aimed at garnering support and investment for the community's future," Cr Gardiner said.

During their stay, the delegation participated in significant events including the Local Government Association Conference and the Australian Council for Local Government meeting, underscoring their commitment to advocacy at both state and national levels. Cr Gardiner emphasised the importance of such opportunities, with 1350 delegates from around Australia, including 130 from Western Australia.

"Trips like these are crucial in raising awareness of the Shire of Dardanup and positioning us for future funding opportunities that will enable our community to thrive," he said.

"Key discussions centred on transformative projects, notably the development of an Intermodal Terminal and Advanced Manufacturing and Technology Hub (AMTECH) in Waterloo.

"Additionally, plans for a Hydrogen Plant and Refuelling Facility at the Shire's Depot in Waterloo were also on the agenda, reflecting the Shire's proactive approach towards sustainable infrastructure and economic growth.

"These engagements underscored the Shire's proactive stance in networking and advocating for community interests on the national stage, ensuring that the voice of the Shire of Dardanup is heard among decision-makers in Canberra.

"We thank Nola Marino, Member for Forrest, for her guidance and assistance with our meetings with Federal agencies and members."

Further details of the outcomes from the Canberra trip will be presented to Council in at the July Ordinary Council Meeting.

John Boyle O'Reilly's escape from Western Australia - In his own words

John Boyle O'Reilly was a Fenian, a member of the 19th-century Irish revolutionary nationalist organization, who was convicted in 1866 of having withheld knowledge of an intended mutiny. Initially sentenced to death, his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment and then to twenty years of penal servitude. He was transported to Western Australia aboard the *Hougoumont* in January 1868. In February the following year, he famously escaped from a Bunbury road gang, with the help of local priest Father Patrick McCabe, and Dardanup farmers, Jim and John Maguire. There are various versions of the story of where O'Reilly was hidden while he awaited escape on an American whaling ship; down a well at the Dardanup Church and up a chimney at one of the Maguires' farms being two.

According to an article O'Reilly himself wrote in 1882, he actually remained in hiding at Buffalo Beach for about two weeks. Dardanup supporters are likely to have deliberately confused the authorities with rumoured locations to distract them from the real hiding place. O'Reilly eventually made it to America and became a celebrated author and poet, as well as editor of the newspaper, *The Boston Pilot*

The 1882 article, downloaded from Trove, is now on the Dardanup Heritage web site. It was initially printed in the *Boston Pilot* and reprinted in the Melbourne *Advocate* in 1882. It is the story of O'Reilly's escape in his own words, just fourteen years after the dramatic events.

Greenbushes to Bunbury Rail Project - Detailed Feasibility Study

Thanks for your patience over the past couple of months. We have been busy working through a range of studies.

We are planning to host the next community information sessions in August. Planning for these is now underway, and once details are finalised the sessions will be advertised via the Talison Lithium website and the email distribution list. The sessions are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

We intend to host further sessions towards the end of the year, to discuss findings and outcomes of studies completed as part of the feasibility study. This will happen before a final report is wrapped up.

With this in mind, we have received a number of enquiries regarding timing. As we progress further, details regarding timing of final reports and decision-making will become available. However, at this stage, it is anticipated that the feasibility study report will be finalised at the end of 2024. This means a decision is likely to be made in Q2 2025.

General Study Update

By way of update:

The ALCAM (i.e. level crossing assessments) are nearing completion. We will have an update for you at the upcoming community information sessions.

Rail condition evaluation is complete, the outcomes of which are informing the rail design.

The Public Transport Authority and Arc Infrastructure have engaged directly with leaseholders.

We are working with experts to understand the requirements for and potential scope of any future noise and vibration studies. This will inform an understanding of the requirements and scope once a project decision has been made.

We know that noise is a concern for some residents. We are doing further work, but here is what we know so far:

If the railway were to be recommissioned, the trains would be required to comply with 'Network Safe Working Rules', set under the *Rail Safety Act 2010*. These rules include compliance with signaling, train speed limits and horn use. In regard to horn use, the rules require that:

Horns must only sounded when a valid reason exists

Horns must be sounded with appropriate intensity, length
and repetition for the circumstances; and

Horns must be sounded when approaching level crossings
and where necessary for safety.

The horn is a key safety tool that gives ample warning of a train approaching. Generally, train drivers are required to sound their horn for a minimum of 3 seconds on approach to a level crossing to meet safety requirements.

referred to as the first Spring and it is when we begin to enjoy the initial flush of wildflower blooms. In a 'normal' year we experience a mix of wet days, clear cold nights, and this trend

doesn't change until late in the month or into September. Unfortunately the current trend seems to be for lower overall rainfall and the amount we do get comes in fewer more severe events. So... as gardeners we will need to get creative and make some changes.

I have spoken to quite a few people over the last 6 months that have been struggling with water to keep their garden hydrated. Many didn't plant a winter vegie patch because tanks and bores were dry. Even if this wasn't the case for you, it doesn't hurt to consider making a few changes to your space so that it is more resilient going into this summer. Now is the time to think about what simple and inexpensive options you can put in place to capture & store more rainwater. Drought proofing is not just for farmers! Olive drums, IBCs and water tanks are great options. Slowing down the movement of water on your block is essential so that it has a chance to infiltrate and hydrate the soil.

Is it worth it? I am asked that question more often these days -My answer is still YES! Growing your own vegies is definitely worth the effort and can be cost effective if you are clever with your crop choice and planting strategy.

It is time to start planning for your spring and summer garden. Growing a variety of crops helps to create abundance and it also helps to provide some resilience in your garden. There are wonderful edible perennials that can provide food when your annual vegies are a bit scarce. Choose ones that will suit your palette and amount of space. Herbs are great flavour enhancers and fairly bullet proof, so easy to grow for beginner gardeners. Why pay \$4 a bunch when you can buy a plant for the same and grow it! Most herbs grow equally well in a pot as they do in the ground. A few delicious options include Basil, Chamomile, Chicory, Chives, Coriander, Dill, Fennel, Garlic Chives, Horseradish, Lemongrass, Lemon Balm, Lemon Verbena, Marjoram, Mint, Oregano, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage, Tarragon and Thyme.

Here are a few tips for reducing your food bill and food waste. Choose crops that will give you the most yield and best value for space. Focus your energies on growing crops that have a short storage life, are used most often in your kitchen and/or are expensive to buy.

Hey Pet Parents, have you heard? **Updates in Pet Vaccination Guidelines!**

In recent years, the World Small Animal Veterinary Association (WSAVA) has updated its guidelines on pet vaccinations based on extensive research and clinical trials. These new recommendations aim to optimize your pet's health while minimizing the risks associated with over-vaccination.

For Puppies:

- 1. Start the vaccination adventure at **6 weeks old**, with shots scheduled every 2-4 weeks until they're over 16 weeks. It's like building a fortress of immunity!
- 2. Don't miss their **booster at 6 months of age** to ensure their defences stay strong.

August heralds the beginning of Ginger, Turmeric and Garlic are easily grown and expensive to the Noongar Season Diilba. It is buy. Parsley, Silverbeet (Swiss Chard) and Spring Onions are reliable, easy to grow staples that will help bulk out your meals and can be grown in very little space. My summer garden always includes Cherry tomatoes. One plant well fed will give you upwards of 10 kg of fruit, so well worth popping one in the garden or a pot on your patio. I also adore green beans, they come in dwarf and climbing varieties and provide a nutrient rich harvest during the warmer months. Best of all, you can grow so many different varieties many aren't available in the shops.

> My winter crops are producing an abundance at the moment so it is the perfect time to preserve any excess for use later. Parsley, celery, onions and greens are great sautéed and frozen. They also take up very little room when dehydrated. As my brassica crops finish off I will start planting quick growing crops to fill the gaps. If you garden in a frost prone area like me, try to be patient as you may need to wait until the end of the month to start any new crops.



Council adopts 2024/25 Annual Budget

From the Shires webiste

A budget that Shire President Tyrrell Gardiner said reflects responsible financial management and community benefits, including a \$506,000 surplus.

Cr Gardiner said the budget features a 5.5% general rate revenue increase, equating to an average increase of \$133 for residential properties. He said the rate increase has been kept in line with Council's Long Term Financial plan, with Council adopting a new Differential Rates Method from 1 July, a significant step towards a fairer and more equitable rates system. "Our budget reflects a balanced approach to managing our financial responsibilities while investing in projects that improve the quality of life for our residents," Cr Gardiner said.

"We are committed to providing essential services and maintaining our infrastructure in a way that supports the growth and sustainability of our community.

"The impact of the rate increase will be softened for many residents through a reduction in the average Eaton Landscaping Specified Area Rate, which will be phased out entirely over the next four years.

"Each year, the Council is required to raise sufficient rates to meet its total expenditure. This year's budget takes into account various factors such as the growth of the Shire, the need for additional facilities and services, and the rising cost of labour, utilities, and materials.

"The Council has been mindful of inflationary pressures and has only increased its fees and charges by CPI where required, or where cost increases or statutory changes have been clearly identified."
