Brian Wells - A Life Well Lived

Brian Wells was born at St Rocks Hospital Bunbury on 12 May 1928 – his parents Elizabeth and Frank were living in Wellington Mills at the time.

When he was three his parents moved to a house in Teede St Bunbury as his father obtained work as a mechanic at Langhands Garage. His sister Sylvia had also been born by this time. The family moved from Bunbury to Dardanup in the early 1930's where his Dad worked on trucks, with the Main Roads and later the local Dardanup Roads Board(pre Dardanup Shire Council) and later buying a farm called Caringa on Recreation Rd, Dardanup in 1935.

Brian attended the Convent School in Dardanup from 1935 and all his school life he only had two teachers who were Sisters of Mercy; Sr M. Kieran and Sr M. Peter. He left school in the May holidays when he turned fourteen.

As his parents farm was close to Dardanup Brian used to walk to school each day and walking home for lunch each day. As a young lad Brian would help with the milking which was all done by hand before going to school and after school as well. He also helped in the house doing chores like washing up and laundry – boiling the copper and using the scubbing board. His mother suffered from dermatitis so was unable to put her hands in water.

After leaving school he helped run the dairy, growing vegetables and general jobs such as digging drains and clearing the land by hand with no means of mechanical help like today. Horse being the only mode for heavy work and the means of transport.

By 1940 Brian had a baby sister Connie and twin brothers Ron and Neil.

During the War years 1939-45 Brian contributed to the war effort by knitting scarves for the soldiers in the front, organising fundraising events such as dances and socials, training the children at the 2 schools in air raid drill as well as instructing them to observe strange planes in the sky and what to do if one appeared.

Brian joined the Voluntary Defence Corp at about the age of fifteen, being too young to join the Army. Later he joined to Air Training Corp or Airforce, learning to identify different planes.

Finally he was accepted for a period of two years in the Australian Navy as a Seaman serving in the South Pacific and Papua New Guinea. The war was over by that stage but ships were still being engaged in mine sweeps, blowing up mines when detected thus preventing damage to other ships in peace time. Brian was discharged from the Navy and came home to Dardanup and together with his Dad worked the farm and in 1949 he purchased Linden Farm with the help of his deferred Navy pay.

In 10 years he worked really hard on the farm getting it all ship shape with fencing completed and farm sheds built. On 30 January 1960 he married Gwen and together they continued farming, rearing calves and pigs later progressing to a milking machine. The milk was separated into cream and sent off to the factory in Bunbury by truck. Later a whole milk license was obtained and milk was picked up in cans by trucks and taken to the factory. Later still refrigerated vats were the go and milk tankers collected the milk directly from the farm. Brian retried from milking at 65 without any regrets.

Brian enjoyed his sport in between all the hard work on the farm travelling to towns a way off like Donnybrook and Bunbury to play cricket as well as coaching junior boys in cricket at Dardanup as part of the Bunbury competition. Brian was on many Committees in the Bunbury Cricket Assoc and was awarded Life Membership for his contributions to cricket in the SW. Brian was also Life Member of the Waterloo Cricket Club(pre Dardanup Cricket Club) and a member for many years.

Brian became Vice President of the Bunbury Hockey Assoc and was responsible for the juniors, taking boys to Narrogin carnivals and even to Tasmania. Eventually also serving as President of the Bunbury Hocket Assoc, responsible for many changes in the Assoc and receiving a Certificate of Merit for his services.

Brian also played football for the Dardanup team travelling to neighbouring towns for games.

Badminton was enjoyed in the early years with Brian winning quite a few competitions, being the inaugural Secretary of the Dardanup Club and later on coaching and running for many years a night competition for the local juniors. Brian was awarded a Life Membership for his services to Badminton.

Brian also enjoyed many years in the Junior Farmers movement, being an inaugural member, excelling in the debating teams and being awarded Life Member. Brian won a trip to the Sydney Royal Show in 1953 as an outstanding Junior Farmer and in later years was an adult advisor to local Dardanup youth. Junior Farmers being the precursor to Rural Youth.

In addition to all his sporting activities he had time to bring up and nurture 10 children supporting them in all their sporting and school activities.

In 1983 Brian received the Australia Day Citizenship Award for outdancing contributions to the local community over the many years of his life in Dardanup. This award was presented to him in the Dardanup Hall by his Excellency the Governor Rear Admiral Sir Richard Trowbridge on behalf of the Dardanup Shire.


Brian was a self taught carpenter having little training but has been responsible for building and renovating many houses, sheds and dairy buildings. Brian always enjoyed wood craft in his workshop and helping his sons in any of their projects and business operations. Brian enjoyed farm life, be it fixing fences or growling at the cattle when they got out.

All in all Brian unconditionally loved all of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren and was eager to help them out whenever he could, enjoyed all the family celebrations be it weddings, birthdays, sport events or new arrivals.

Brian and Gwen were married for 64 years and he was 96 when he passed away, still living at home on his farm at Dardanup.

Eds note; In 1955 when the Dardanup Hall was partially built the builder absconded. The community wouldn't be deterred and a 'Welfare Committee' was set up to find a way through and complete the hall construction. Brian was the Secretary of that Committee and they set about raising funds and completing the build. The following is an excerpt from the Dardanup Heritage Collective website with regards to the construction of the Dardanup Hall by the community.

"Brian personally spent many hours on the seemingly never-ending solid wandoo floor. The boards are 4.6 meters long and were only 65mm wide. He recalls "they needed to be drilled and then the nails could be hammered through to the joists, as wandoo is so hard". Even on the day of the opening Brian was frantically working to finish the floor with only a few hours to spare. His will to finish this beautiful floor had been driven by the determination to be the first to dance on it. That night at the opening Gala Ball as Jack Bartlett's 5-piece orchestra limbered up, Brian partnered with Gwen Harris, ready for the first music beat on which they stepped across the floor, indeed giving Brian his reward of 'being the first to dance a lap' upon his seeming nemesis, the dance floor. This floor remains one of the Halls finest features almost 70 years later."



Brian certainly loved Dardanup and our community has been better for all his years of service, in particular the work he did shaping our young people through his involvement in sport and community groups.

Concept Plans for Burekup, Dardanup Community Upgrades Available for Viewing From the Shire website

The Shire of Dardanup has unveiled comprehensive concept plans outlining proposed upgrades to the Burekup and Dardanup community precincts, marking a significant milestone following extensive community consultation.

Shire President Cr Tyrrell Gardiner said Council endorsed the final concept plans for the Burekup Community and Sporting Precinct upgrade and the Dardanup Community Cultural and Heritage Precinct upgrade at its June Ordinary Council Meeting.

Cr Gardiner said these concept plans will now serve as strategic roadmaps, outlining the future community facilities and projects aimed at enhancing local amenities.

"Council has actively engaged with both communities, incorporating valuable input from Working Groups and a recent community survey which garnered nearly 140 responses," Cr Gardiner said. "Over the past few years, we have worked closely with residents to identify their priorities, particularly focusing on enhancing community amenities."

Cr Gardiner said both concept plans proposed new skate parks and pump tracks to provide local youth with recreational opportunities. "With the Burekup Cricket Club having more than 10 teams, including juniors and women's teams featured in the local competition, there are a lot of youth in the community and surrounding areas that will benefit from the precinct upgrades. "The Burekup concept plan includes new changerooms and a functions facility in addition to the Burekup District County Club. "The Dardanup concept plan celebrates the community's heritage with the proposed hall upgrades and related buildings, which also establishes facilities for youth.

"Refurbishing the Dardanup Hall will not only bring this community facility up to standard, but allow the hall to be the Shire's primary evacuation centre."

Cr Gardiner thanked all community members and Working Groups who contributed their insights into the development of these two concept plans.

"This feedback is instrumental in ensuring that these proposed upgrades align effectively with the evolving needs and aspirations of our community," Cr Gardiner said.

"The concept plans not only streamline strategic project planning but also aim to bolster advocacy efforts for securing necessary funding to bring these visions to fruition."





Gardening with Wink

September is the second month of the Noongar season *Djilba* and as the month rolls on cool nights and mornings make way for warmer, sunny days. The wildflower show begins and in the garden we need to

Prepare ourselves for an invasion of weeds, pests and an overwhelming urge to plant...

Spring sunshine makes the garden smile and thankfully the recent rains mean we can plan our summer gardens with more confidence. The soil is still a bit cold, so I find it useful to take my cues from the garden. Self sown annual and perennials (Chicory, Calendula, Borage, Silverbeet etc.) begin to pop up when the conditions are right. If the self sown ones happen to be in the wrong spot, I simply transplant while they are still small and water them in with a seaweed tonic to reduce transplant shock

There are plenty of online guides on when to plant what in your garden, however it is useful to note that there are timing differences within our region. Bunbury is generally 6 weeks later than Perth, with Dardanup and the Ferguson another 2 weeks later again. If you are prone to frost, then keep an eye out for the overnight forecast and be prepared to protect new plantings from late frosts and cold snaps. Use frost cloth, cloches or even upturned pots. More than once I have been the crazy plant lady out in the garden at night, headlamp on, putting frost protection over my tender seedlings;)

Take the opportunity while you wait for warmer weather to get a few jobs in the garden.

Weeds, glorious weeds... We all have them and with a bit of warm weather they will start to appear everywhere! The old adage is "One year of seeds equals seven years of weeds" so try to get on top of them now before they go to seed. Why not utilise them to create home grown, low-cost fertility! You can make weed tea, build compost piles or simply feed them to your chooks *Greens equal yellow yolks*. A great way to reduce your workload is to sheet mulch, smoother the weeds with a thick layer of wet newspaper or cardboard and mulch over the top. The weeds die down and compost in-situ.

Uninvited guests... As the weather warms up we often see an influx of pests such as caterpillars, snails, slugs, moths and aphids. Don't be too hasty with the sprays, often a small container of soapy water or a gloved hand (squishing) are better, safer and cheaper options.

Be Prepared. We expect a lot from our plot, growing vegies requires fertile soil so add compost, manures, blood & bone, rock dust etc where necessary. Check the wetting ability and pH levels if you have had difficulty growing recently. Now is the time to make all the necessary amendments for an abundant summer crop and to ensure you avoid problems such as blossom end rot. Make the most of your growing area by including some vertical space. Beans, cucumbers, zucchini and pumpkins can all be trained on a trellis. They can give you shade and a crop - Win, Win! Installing the trellis structures prior to planting limits root damage and having some ideas for creating shade will save you time and heart-ache mid summer.

Growing your own is a great way to save money but it is important to be clever with your space and crop choices. Self sufficiency is a term often only used for people who grow most or all of what they need - however

this is rarely possible and a huge amount of work!! Instead, perhaps we should look for one or two things that we could be self sufficient with for example Herbs and/or Salad greens. Could you grow enough of these so you didn't need to buy them? They take up very little space, can be grown in pots and give you value for money. Rationalise what you grow. Whether you are limited with space, time or water you can still grow some of your own food and save money. Fruit trees are a bit of a luxury, they require a good amount of space and water only cropping over a fairly short period. If you are limited on space but still keen to grow trees in a pot then a Lemon or Lime is a good choice, as they are expensive to buy in the shops.

Are you keen to have tomatoes for Christmas? Well now is the time to get organised! Selecting the right variety can make a big difference. Not all varieties have a decent yield so it is worth doing a bit of homework on the varieties you are keen to plant. When planting from seed take note of the number of days to harvest. My favourite early maturing red variety is 'Stupice' as it starts fruiting at 50-60 days from transplant and I am also trialling another early variety 'Kotlas' this year. Pink Egg and Apollo, Sweetie and Black Cherry are other early varieties at 65 days. You still have time to plant seeds (indoors) for these or you can speed up the process by purchasing seedlings. The small 6-8 punnet types are usually 4-6 weeks old and the potted ones about 8-10 weeks. They generally get a bit of a shock when you plant them out and may take a week or two to settle in. Mid fruiting varieties (70-80 days) include Tommy toe, Black Russian, Mortgage Lifter and Amish Paste. The latest fruiting ones are generally the Beefsteaks and sauce making varieties such as Gross Lisse and Roma (80 days as a seedling and 100 days from seed!) If you are limited on space, I would suggest growing a Cherry type as they have high yields (10kgs +) over a long period and the best disease resistance.

Itching to get planting... Be mindful of the soil temperature and if you can wait until next month to plant out summer crops...

What can I plant in September?

Leafy crops - Amaranth, Lettuce, Mustard, Silverbeet, Choi Sum, Gai Lan, Mibuna, Mizuna, Pak Choy, Fennel, Celery, Watercress, Purslane, Rocket, French Cress, Sorrel, NZ spinach, Chicory, Endive, Cabbage, Chinese cabbage, Corn Salad Brassicas - Cabbage, Kale, Spinach Roots & onions - Beetroot, Radish, Kohlrabi, Carrot, Parsnip, Salsify, Scorzonera, Turnip, Celeriac, Daikon, Potato, Leeks, Spring Onions, Jerusalem Artichokes Legumes - Broad Beans, Dwarf beans, Climbing beans, Snow peas, Asparagus pea Curcubits - Cucumber Herbs - Globe Artichoke, Asparagus, Basil, Buckwheat, Coriander, Strawberry plants, Dill, Borage, Nasturtium, Oregano, Sage, Cape Gooseberry, Mint, Tarragon, Lemon Balm, Edible Chrysanthemum, Parsley, Rhubarb, Rosemary, Summer savoury, Fennel, Horseradish In the Greenhouse - Capsicum, Chilli, Eggplant, Luffa, Tomato, Tomatillo, Sunflower, Rockmelon, Pumpkin, Watermelon, Zucchini

Pet Health Tips for Traveling around Australia

Traveling with pets in Australia can be rewarding but requires extra vigilance due to specific health risks. Here's a concise guide to keeping your furry friends safe:

- 1. **Parvovirus**: This severe viral illness affects dogs and can be fatal. Ensure your dog's vaccinations are up-to-date and avoid high-traffic dog areas.
- 2. **Leptospirosis**: Spread through contaminated water or soil, this bacterial disease can be serious. Avoid stagnant water and ensure vaccinations are current.
- 3. **Heartworm**: Transmitted by mosquitoes, heartworm is common in Australia. Use preventative medications as advised by your vet.
- 4. **Ticks**: Ticks can transmit diseases like Tick Paralysis. Use tick preventatives, check your pet regularly for ticks, and avoid grassy or wooded areas.
- 5. **Fleas**: Fleas are prevalent and can cause itching. Use flea prevention treatments and check your pet frequently.
- 6. **Heatstroke**: Australian heat can be intense. Provide fresh water, avoid walking during peak heat, and ensure your pet has a shaded area.

7. **Snakes**: Australia is home to various venomous snakes, Including red bellied black snakes, black whip snakes and tiger snakes plus many more. Keep pets on a leash, avoid tall grass, and be cautious in snake-prone areas. If your pet is bitten, seek immediate veterinary help.

Ehrlichia: Ehrlichia is a bacteria that is passed on by infected ticks. Mostly found in tropical and subtropical regions. It has been confirmed in dogs found in the Pilbara, Gascoyne and Northern Goldfields of WA. Ehrlichia causes symptoms of a fever, lethargy, swollen lymph nodes and more. The chronic form or ehrlichia can be fatal. Check your pets regularly for ticks and keep up to date with your tick preventatives.

Travel Tips:

- **Pre-Travel Vet Check**: Confirm vaccinations and overall health.
- **Parasiticides**: Ensure your pet is up to date with flea, tick and worming treatment before travelling. Consider using a flea and tick collar.
- Pack Essentials: Include food, water, medications, and a first-aid kit.
- Local Vet Contacts: Know the contact information for nearby vet clinics.
- **Identification**: Ensure your pet has a microchip or ID tag.

By staying prepared and informed, you can help ensure a safe and enjoyable trip for both you and your pet.

Regional Pensioner Travel Card Info

The Regional Pensioner Travel Card provides eligible pensioners with up to \$675.00 a year towards the cost of fuel and/or taxi travel from participating providers, offering more support for the transport needs of

pensioners living in regional areas.
The Regional Pensioner Travel Card is funded by the State Government and administered by the Department of Transport.

Who is eligible to apply for a Regional Pensioner Travel Card?

To be eligible for a Regional Pensioner Travel Card, you must be: Receiving a Centrelink(link is external) Age Pension, Carer Payment, Disability Support Pension, or a Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) Service Pension, Social Security Age Pension or Income Support Supplement; and living in an eligible regional location.

How to apply for a Regional Pensioner Travel Card (new recipients) Obtain a Regional Pensioner Travel Card application form from participating Australia Post offices.

- 1. Present your Centrelink or Department of Veterans' Affairs Pension Card when submitting your application form at the participating post office.
- 2. Your name and addresses (residential and postal) on the application form must match your Centrelink or Department of Veterans' Affairs' record. Submit your application form to the post office attendant by 15 May of each year. Note: For administrative purposes, applications are closed and cannot be accepted or processed between 31 May and 30 June each year.

The Taj Mahal is located a few hours out of Delhi in a place call Agra and I can tell you that it is just as amazing in real life as in photos. It truly was a sight to be seen and something I will never forget. I would never have thought of going to India myself, but after this incredible experience I would definitely return, however not in the monsoon season though!
